On this 27<sup>th</sup> day of Decem-

ber 1832, personally appeared in open Court be-  
fore the Worshipful Justices of the Court of Pleas  
and Quarter Sessions for said County now sitting  
Joseph Campbell a resident of said County of  
Hamilton and State of Tennessee aged seventy  
years who being first duly sworn according to  
law, doth on his oath make the following dec-  
laration in order to obtain the benefit of the  
act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States  
under the following named officers - and served  
as herein stated, that is to say under Captain  
Bradley in Albemarle County Virginia, as a  
drafted Militia man, and was marched by him  
to the barracks in Albemarle to guard the  
Germans and Tories (prisoners) at the barracks  
and was one of the guard that guarded  
them to Winchester across the Blue Ridge  
This applicant was then about seventeen he thinks  
and served about three months under Capt  
Bradley as above stated, returned home and  
was discharged by him - This applicant being  
entirely illiterate, has no recollection of the  
dates of his services, whatever. His father a-  
bout this time or shortly after removed from  
Albemarle to Washington County Virginia, where  
this applicant was drafted under Capt Robert  
Edmonson, and Col. William Campbell and  
was marched by them to the Virginia frontiers  
to guard and protect forts Black, Bryant  
and Edmonson, and scour the frontiers - after  
having been actively engaged in the above named

service three months the time for which he was  
drafted he returned home and was discharged  
by Capt Edmonson. This service was performed  
the summer before the battle at King's Mountain  
during which this applicant was in an engage-  
ment with the Indians on the South fork of  
Holston in which twenty two Indians were  
killed, and but one of our men slightly  
wounded. This applicant soon afterwards sub-  
stituted in his father Joseph Campbell's place  
under Capt Edmonson and Col Campbell and  
was marched by them to King's Mountain, where  
he was in the battle since called King's Mountain  
battle, and remained in service after the battle as  
one of the guard, until the three months for which  
he substituted expired, when he returned home  
and was discharged by Col Campbell, Capt-  
Edmonson having been killed at the battle  
at King's Mountain. <sup>Shortly</sup> after this applicant returns  
home from serving this last tour he was elec-  
ted Ensign in Capt Black's company and was  
Commissioned by Patrick Henry then Gover-  
nor of Virginia, and served three months as  
Ensign under Capt Black who was sent  
with his company to guard and assist the  
hands in cutting out the Kentucky Road  
having performed this service the company  
returned and was discharged by Capt  
Black. This applicant served in all twelve  
months during the Revolution, he has long  
since lost his discharges and Commissions, &  
knows not what has become of them, he has  
no documentary evidence of his services in the  
Revolution, nor does he know of any person  
whose testimony he can procure that can testi-  
fy to his services - he states that he has no recollection  
of having served with any regular troops

3 He states that he was born in Culpeper County Virginia as stated by his father to him but does not know in what year, nor does he recall that he ever knew, he has no record of his age nor never had, but from the best calculations he is able to make by the ages of his children He is upwards of seventy years old - He has stated where he lived when he entered the service, since the Revolution he lived in Virginia ten or twelve years, he removed from there to Sevier County Tennessee and resided there between twenty five and thirty years from Sevier County to Rhea Co. Tenn. lived there eight or ten years from there to this County (Crittendon) where he has resided about four ten years, and still resides -

He stated that he is known in his present neighborhood to Robert Patterson Esq. James Hiddle Esq. and George H. Quinn Esq. but not to any clergyman that he can obtain - who can testify as to his character for veracity and good behavior and Thinks he is of his services as a soldier of the Revolution

He has by relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any Agency of any State -

My dear Mr McReynolds:

In response to your letter of the thirty-first ultimo, and the enclosed letter of Mr. T. J. Campbell of Chattanooga, Tennessee, I have the honor to advise you, that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 3414, it appears that Joseph Campbell was born in Culpeper County, Virginia, date not stated.

He enlisted in Albemarle County, Virginia and served three months as private in Captain Bradley's Virginia Company, date not given.

His father, Joseph Campbell moved about this time from Albemarle to Washington County, Virginia, where, he, ( the son ) enlisted in the summer of 1780, served in Capt in Robert Edmonson's Company, Colonel William Campbell's Virginia Regiment and was in an engagement with Indians on the Holston River.

He next substituted for his father, served three months under the same officers and was at the battle of Kings Mountain.

Shortly after, he was appointed Ensign of Captain Black's Virginia Company, and was engaged in cutting out the Kentucky Road, for three months.

He was allowed pension, on his application executed November 28, 1832, while living in Hamilton County, Tennessee, aged seventy years. He died in Bradley County, Tennessee, leaving a widow but her name and those of his children are not on record.

There is no further data on file as to his family.

For the date of last payment of his pension and name of the person paid, you should apply to the Pension Section, Civil Division, General Accounting Office, 1800 E. St. N. W. Washington, D. C. citing all of the following data. Ctf. 18166, issued August 14, 1833, rate \$40 per annum, commenced March 4, 1831, Act of June 7, 1832, East Tennessee Agency, pensioner Joseph Campbell.

You are herewith furnished the history of the only pensioner of the War of 1812, named William Campbell, who enlisted from Tennessee.

From the papers in the pension claim, Widow 11391, it appears that William L. Campbell enlisted November 15, 1814, and served as a private in Captain John Lewis' Company of Tennessee Militia until discharged June 5, 1815.
